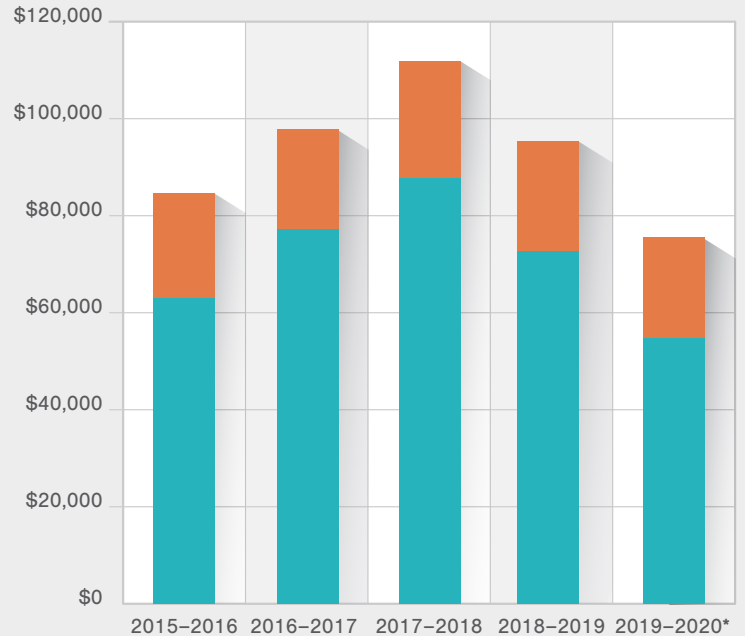

Engaging Component Groups

Most of the Named Funds are administered by SOT Regional Chapters, Special Interest Groups, and Specialty Sections, allowing them an avenue to bestow awards and engage their current and future members.

Granting Global Awards and Fellowships

Multiple funds provide awards to individuals in developing or underrepresented countries to participate in US-based toxicology events in order to forge collaborations with SOT members and access new educational opportunities.

Supporting a Variety of Scientific Disciplines

Twenty-eight of the Named Funds are geared toward various scientific disciplines and are managed by 17 different specialty sections.

Sponsoring Internships

Internships provide outstanding graduate and undergraduate students the opportunity to get hands-on experience in toxicology research.

Education Fund



The Education Fund enhances focused targets of opportunity for SOT's educational initiatives and has previously supported the CDI Undergraduate Program and the new Graduate Intern Fellowship in Toxicology (GIFT) program.

Global Activities Fund



The Global Activities Fund provides global leadership for advancing the science of toxicology and in 2019-2020 funded the recording of Continuing Education sessions at the International Congress of Toxicology XV (ICTXV), so that the recordings could make available to members in developing countries.

Strategic Priorities Fund



The Strategic Priorities Fund helps implement key aspects of the SOT Strategic Plan, such as increased partnerships and collaborations with other scientific societies, including joint sessions with other scientific societies. In 2019-2020, the fund provided travel fellowships for individuals from developing countries to the International Congress of Toxicology XV (ICTXV).

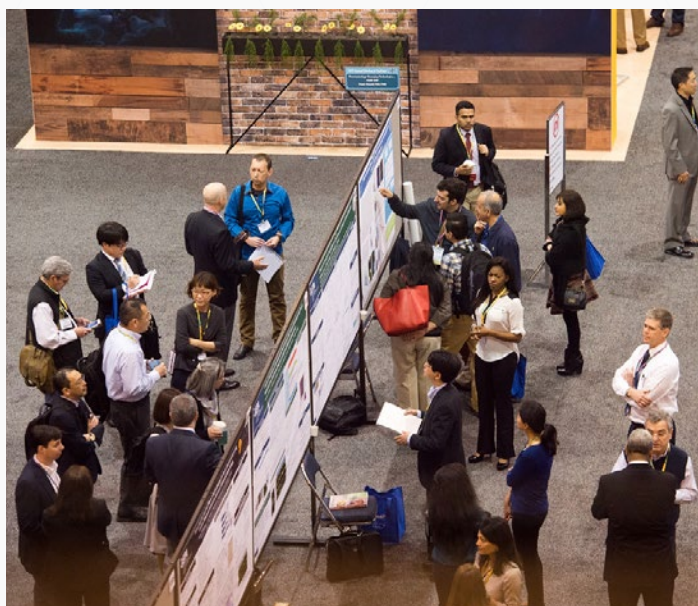
