Education Mission Fund

The Education Mission Fund enhances focused targets of opportunity for SOT's educational initiatives and has supported the CDI Undergraduate Program, Graduate Intern Fellowship in Toxicology (GIFT) program, and Graduate Student Awards.

Global Activities Mission Fund

The Global Activities Mission Fund provides global leadership for advancing the science of toxicology and has previously supported travel fellowships for international members and provided globally accessible educational materials.

Strategic Priorities Mission Fund

The Strategic Priorities Mission Fund helps implement key aspects of the SOT Strategic Plan, such as supporting trainee awards, and increased partnerships and collaborations with other scientific societies.

Mission

The SOT Endowment Fund aids toxicology and toxicologists through a series of funds that support SOT programs and members. SOT bears the administrative expenses of the Endowment Fund, assuring that every dollar contributed goes directly to supporting programs.

Individuals are designated as a Paracelsus Circle giver at the point that they make an initial contribution of \$500 or more and indicate their intention to make additional contributions to reach \$5,000 or more within 10 years. Individuals are designated as a Lifetime Paracelsus Circle giver once their cumulative endowment gifts reach one of the above Lifetime Paracelsus levels.

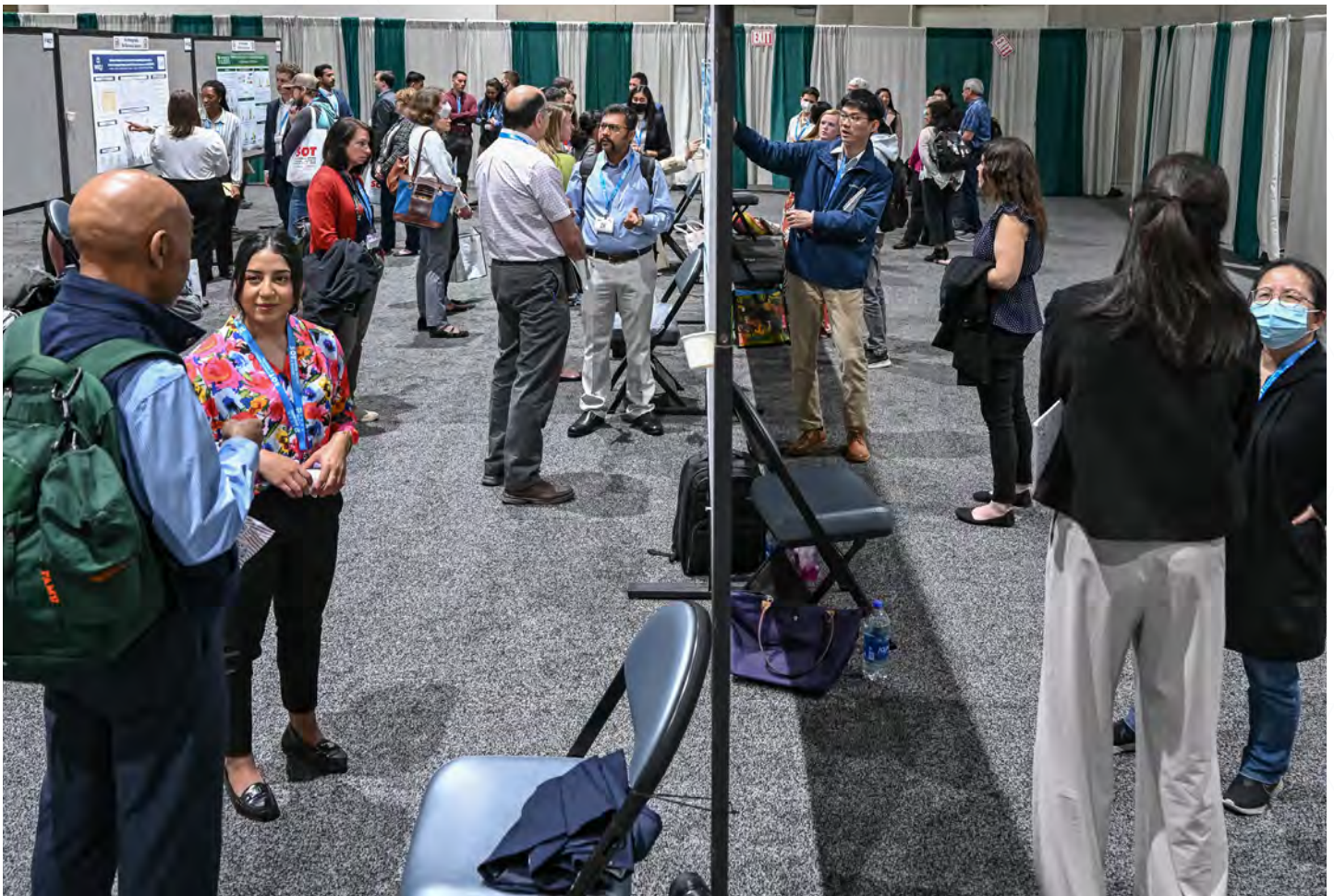
