

## Recognizing Achievements

More than 50% of the Named Funds provide support to recognize achievements of students and postdoctoral scholars.

## Encouraging Diversity

Ten funds provide support for ethnic diversity based on scientific quality.

## Ensuring Stable, Long-Term Support

Endowment-funded activities receive support regardless of fluctuations in the operating budget, providing a reliable income source to support critical mission-related activities.

## Granting Graduate Student Awards

Funds provide awards to graduate students to recognize poster or platform presentations, enabling them to form connections with SOT members and advancing their engagement with other scientists.
