We enable this mission through the generous contributions—large or small—of SOT members and their families and friends. 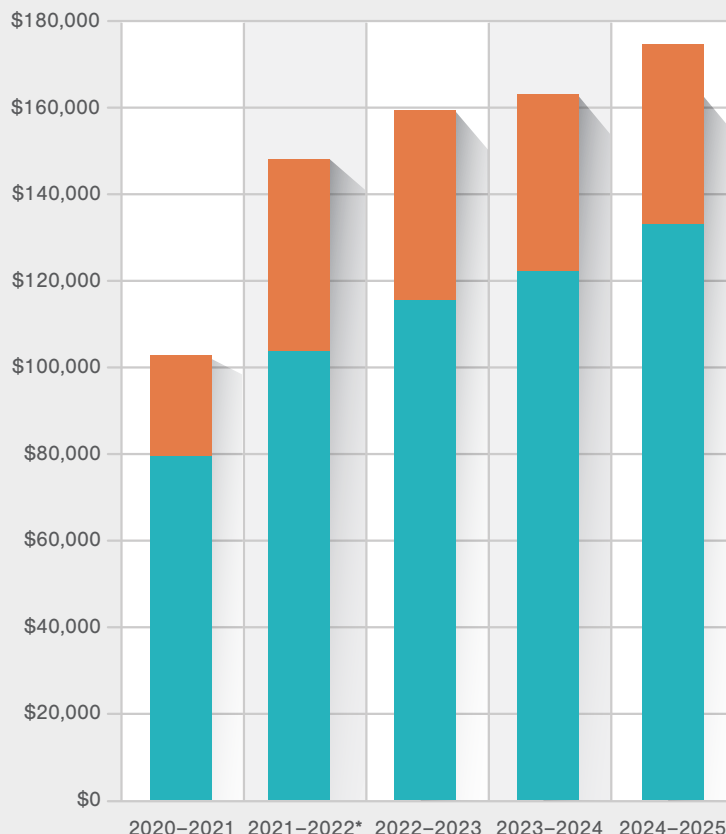

Endowment-funded activities receive support regardless of fluctuations in the operating budget, providing a reliable income source to support critical mission-related activities.

Granting Graduate Student Awards

Funds provide awards to graduate students to recognize poster or platform presentations, enabling them to form connections with SOT members and advancing their engagement with other scientists.

We named the award in honor of Lois Lehman-McKeeman due to her unwavering support of and contributions to SOT, her commitment to training early career investigators, and her passion for studying the mechanisms underlying toxicity. Contributions to this fund will empower the next generation of toxicologists at the pivotal start of their careers, while celebrating the legacy of an exceptional leader and visionary in the SOT community."
