

IV. Newsletter: The A-E SOT Newsletter is in production and will be posted after our website is updated.

V. Website: With the support of SOT (Raul Suarez), we began a major overhaul of our website, and this process is still ongoing. We anticipate that this upgrading will be complete by October 2012.

VI. 2013 Annual Meeting: We have selected 30-31 May 2013 for next year's meeting. This will be held at the WVU Erikson Alumni Center (<http://alumni.wvu.edu/eac>). The WVU Department of Physiology & Pharmacology has already committed financial and administrative support. Charles River has also committed to financial support and vendor participation. We are pursuing additional support through the WVU Center for Cardiovascular & Respiratory Center, the WVU Health Science Center Research and Graduate Studies Office, and several other vendors.

VII. New Meetings: The Student Committee (Chaired by Hannah Pope-Varsalona) initiated a Student Interests Meeting. To date, this meeting has initiated a student membership drive, added "lunch with an expert" to our 2013 meeting program. This new meeting will be held quarterly, and the location will alternate between sponsoring Institutions.

VII. Budget/Bank Statement: Generous donations from sponsors (Fisher Scientific, DSI and TSI) and an increase in meeting attendance resulted in a budget surge in the A-E SOT account over the course of this year. All outstanding balances had been paid. As of our most recent account balance on ToxChange (May 2012), A-E SOT has \$12,812. This represents greater than a \$3000 increase since 2011. Furthermore, we are now operating in the black. Sponsors are being pursued for the coming fiscal year, and we have already secured one (Charles River), as well as Institutional support (WVU). We will pursue SOT support next year for our annual meeting as well. The purpose of this will be two-fold: 1) expand our awards for graduate students, post-doctoral fellows and young investigators, and 2) increase our outreach impacts.

VIII. Outreach: The 2010-2011 A-E SOT Annual report was late. As such, it encompassed our long-standing support of the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science (PJAS) with two merit-based monetary awards to outstanding middle and high school students. We are not including the activity again in this report to avoid redundancy. Nonetheless, we would like to indicate that our reports are back on the SOT timeline, and not only will PJAS support continue, but we will also initiate formal outreach to more young scientists in public schools in the A-E SOT region.
