From the MBSS President

I enjoyed seeing many of you at the 2009 Annual Meeting of the SOT in Baltimore. I was pleased with the strong attendance at the Monday evening reception and business meeting. Over half our 176 members were present and enjoyed conversation with colleagues, refreshments, and presentations by our student and postdoctoral award winners. The MBSS continued its tradition of strong meeting attendance and member-chaired sessions on the annual meeting program. The Specialty Sections are being asked to play a larger role in the Annual Meetings and the business of the SOT regarding communication, web page content, annual meeting planning, etc. If you have suggestions for improving our specialty section, feel free to contact me or any of the members of the executive board throughout the year.

Our membership numbers are up over the past few years, and it is satisfying to see an increase in the number of student members and their direct involvement in MBSS activities. However, it is critical for MBSS to continue to have membership growth and there are several ways to accomplish this. First, all MBSS members can contact 1-2 colleagues about MBSS and try to get them to join. Second, it is very important for all lab PIs to inform students and post-docs about the MBSS and get them involved. Our by-laws allow for two MBSS student representatives (on staggered two-year terms) to the SOT Student Advisory Council and the MBSS Executive Board. Remember that it is important to consider postdocs as session co-chairs when developing proposals to get them involved in MBSS activities.

In 2007, we established the MBSS Endowment Fund and had achieved our initial goal of \$25,000 by the 2009 annual meeting. Therefore, it is now a Permanently Restricted Net Asset Fund to support student and postdoctoral awards and travel. Thank you to all who have contributed so generously. For those who have not yet done so, please consider what you may give – so that we can continue to support graduate student and postdoctoral awards, and in the future, travel. We welcome suggestions over the next year for potential “naming rights” of this fund, recognizing an individual or organization that reflects the commitment of the MBSS in support and development of graduate students and postdoctoral fellows within the SOT.

First Place (\$500)



MBSS Student and Postdoc Awards

The MBSS is pleased to announce the opportunity for graduate students and post-doctoral fellows to compete for research awards in molecular toxicology.

- **Graduate Student Awards**

Applicants must be full-time students as of October 1, 2009 and research should be in the general area of molecular toxicology. Applicants should submit a copy of their abstract (which must be submitted to SOT by Oct 3), along with a 2-page narrative describing their research hypothesis, background and significance (both in one pdf file). They should also arrange for a letter of recommendation to be sent by their advisor. Three awards will be made: 1st place will receive \$500, 2nd place will receive \$300, and 3rd place will receive \$100. All awardees will receive a plaque at the annual meeting of the SOT, and will present a 5-minute synopsis of their research at the MBSS meeting.

- **Postdoctoral Fellow Research Award**

Applicants must have completed a Ph.D. and be either a student or postdoctoral member of SOT. Research should be in the general area of molecular toxicology. Applicants should submit a copy of their abstract (which must be submitted to SOT by Oct 3), along with a 2-page narrative describing their research hypothesis, background and significance (both in one pdf file). They should also arrange for a letter of recommendation to be sent by their advisor. A single post-doctoral award will be made for \$500. The winner will also receive a plaque at the annual meeting of the SOT and will present a 5-minute synopsis of their research at the MBSS meeting.
