Dawn Wesson, director of the Vector-Borne Infectious Diseases Initiative in Tulane University's School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine. Dr. Wesson spoke on Zika virus infection and spread, and the risks posed to public health. She has served as Chair of the Entomological Society of America and as a member of the Gulf War and Health: Infectious Disease Committee at the Institute of Medicine.
