- A lot of support (and membership) to SOT comes from big pharma and biotech. Would like to see more emphasis on SOT awards and Key speakers from these groups, vs just academia

XII. Feedback to the Society:

- A. What is the one thing the Society should be doing that it currently does not do (or does not do effectively) that would be of importance/benefit to the members of the Specialty Section?

Make it easier to post job descriptions through Specialty Section (ie do not have to post on SOT job bank). Easier to reimburse Executive Committee for Executive Committee functions (lunch or dinner at SOT). More logistical support at SOT meetings setting up equipment. Sponsor photos at SOT (headshots) for leadership and general membership. More coordination of possible mentoring activities, set up framework and cross specialty group sharing activities, ie just opt in to participate. Some Specialty Sections by themselves may not have enough students to warrant putting one on by themselves. We are looking for ways to do this.
